



n the south east of the Italian island of Sicily stand the Hyblaen Mountains. And on a mountain plateau, at an altitude of 500 metres, lies the city of Ragusa. Architecture aficionados gaze in wonder here at the astounding city buildings and striking structures from the Baroque era. But the city, which is a UNESCO world heritage site, is also home to wholly modern buildings. Outside of the historic city centre is the Casa Puntara newbuild, a private family home that was completed in 2020. The villa spans three floors, taking into account both the different heights of the driveway and entrance of the house as well as the various views of the surrounding landscape. All three levels can be seen from the street. Above the solidly constructed base clad in rough stone typical of the region is the white-plastered first floor, fitted with large windows and Panorama Design sliding doors. On the \longrightarrow





second floor, manually moving oak panels provide shade for the room behind.

The first floor is the entrance level, accessed from the street via two footbridges. Here is where the living room, kitchen and bedroom are located. A slimline staircase takes you to the second floor. In addition to spaces for the children, a work area dominated by a large bookcase has also been set up here. The generous roof balcony can be accessed through a window front which can be opened along its entire length with sliding doors. The ground floor hosts a second kitchen with a dining room, as well as a spa with a hammam, workout area and indoor pool.

The large, floor-to-ceiling Panorama Design sliding doors provide a view of the pool and palms, as well as olive and carob trees. A highlight is the corner glazed solution with no mullions, which seamlessly connects the cooking area to the garden. Bella Sicilia – you won't find a nicer way of living.

DID YOU KNOW?

TREE SEEDS AND GEMSTONES

What do a 1-carat diamond and a seed from the carob tree, plentiful in Italy, have in common? They both weigh 0.2 grams. That's no coincidence. In antiquity, people noticed that the weight of these seeds, in contrast to the seeds of other types of trees, was unusually consistent. Specifically, they were always 0.2 grams. So the little brown seeds were used on scales to weigh gold and gemstones. The term "carat" stems from the Greek word "Keration" and the Arabic term "qirat". Both expressions mean "pod of the carob tree". Researchers later found that the weight of the individual seeds of the carob tree varied just as much as many other species.






BRINGING THE OUTDOORS

ine and Martin Tarpgaard are calm and relaxed when talking about their home. Perhaps it's just their nature. Or perhaps it's down to the feeling of wellbeing that washes over you when you think about your dream home. The villa in the Danish town of Fredericia formally invites you to relax and lose yourself in thought.

You keep wanting to pause and take stock of the outstanding views of the sea. You

don't need to go very far to do this. No matter where you are in the living space – the sofa, desk, dining table, or even the kitchen island – your eye is always drawn to the outside. This wasn't always the case. The Tarpgaards spent ten years living in a red brick house, where they could only enjoy the beautiful views from its simple windows. But Line and Martin wanted more. They wanted to see more, feel more, enjoy more. So they decided to tear down their old house and build —





a new one. The result of the four yearlong design and construction process is a large and functional villa, which blends in seamlessly with the surroundings due to the materials used and its open architecture. While large Classic Design sliding doors and façade systems keep the views open towards the Baltic Sea, a continuous wall on the front side of the house shields the property from the road, thereby providing sufficient privacy.

Decisions, decisions... how can such a small word carry so much weight? Sometimes we make them instinctively, without a second thought – but at other times we dither, deliberate and really struggle to make the "right" call.

ecisions shape our lives. Some of us find it easy to make them, others not so much. We don't break out in a sweat when we're deciding which socks to wear the next day. In order to establish whether a sliding door or patio door is the right solution for you, you need to decide what functions you want the door to have. Do you want to be able to let the children or cat inside or outside quickly? Or would you prefer to

enjoy unrestricted views from the comfort of your sofa, whatever the weather? Then there's the question of where the door is going to be used: in the living room, kitchen or bedroom? There are many different options. How much space do you have? And how much do you want to use for your door?





rchitect Aud Randi Astad was heavily involved in the project from the word go. She explains, "During the planning stage, the clients were mainly looking for the largest possible windows and open-plan architecture." That's understandable, given the coastal location with fantastic views of the Romsdalsfjord and the majestic Romsdal Alps, which features one of Norway's highest peaks.

In order to meet this wish, large areas of glass and sliding doors were installed. These forge the perfect link between the inside and outside spaces and let the beautiful surroundings become part of the home. The architect herself is delighted with the "floating" living room. The entire panorama of Molde opens out from there, offering unparalleled views. Speaking of panoramas, Panorama ->



Design sliding doors were chosen to maximise this. As their name suggests, they provide virtually unrestricted views of outside. The high level of transparency is achieved through particularly narrow profiles.

The façade extends to room height and the horizontal profiles are only visible from the outside. "This enables seamless transitions between the façades and large sliding doors, as well as stepless transitions between the living space and patio," explains Aud Randi Astad. The sliding door also features all-glass corners without any profiles. To further intensify the close connection between living space and outdoors and make the building design as sustainable as possible, strong, natural materials were used in the house.



DID YOU KNOW?

WHO WAS RICHARD NEUTRA?

Austrian-born Richard Joseph Neutra (who died on 16th April 1970 at Haus Kemper in Wuppertal) was one of the most famous architects of the 20th Century. He played a pivotal role in defining the Californian architectural scene of the 1950s and 60s with his modernist houses. His most famous building is the 1946 "Kaufmann Desert House" that he designed for Edgar J. Kaufmann and which was built in Palm Springs, California. Even today, Neutra's buildings continue to inspire many architects. Not just because of their slimline designs but also due to their large glazed areas that connect the architecture to the landscape.





KEMPER HOUSE – WUPPERTAL

AS GOOD AS NEUTRA

Anyone considering renovating an old house has undoubtedly asked themselves the question "Is it worth it?" In the case of Kemper House in Wuppertal, designed by Richard Neutra, the answer is a loud, resounding "Yes!"

he two-storey building sits on a hill with views over Gelpetal, the wooded local recreation area. With its open plan room concept, large glass fronts and sliding units, the house reflects the American archetypes of its time. Everything a home could need back then was found within 380 square metres – from the au pair's living space right through to the gentleman's room. When the new owners, Manfred and Sarah Hering, had the opportunity to purchase this hidden architectural gem from 1965, they jumped at the chance - much to the delight of their dogs, Leni, Maya and Puschi, as this house in the countryside was like a little slice of heaven to them. Conversion work carried out by the previous owners, however, had completely changed the original character of the house. So the Herings set to work with the aim of restoring it to its former glory. As the proprietor of Early 911S, a company that restores classic Porsches, Manfred Hering was well-versed in the challenges of restoration. The same approach that is taken for historic cars was used for the renovation - the building management technology was updated, then damaged parts were repaired. Wherever components could not be saved, they were replaced using designs and colours that were as close as possible to the original. Restoring the house to its original state was the greatest challenge. "We learnt something every day during the renovation," explains Manfred Hering. "Old plans and images from the construction period as well as visits to the nearby Pescher House by Richard Neutra, which remains \mathbf{p} largely in its original condition, were a great help."



SURREY HILLS – UK

AT THE HEART OF THE SURREY HILLS

Historic villages, untouched countryside and manor houses with beautifully manicured gardens exemplify the Surrey Hills.

Hidden within this rural idyll is a house that, despite its modern architecture, is perfectly integrated into its surroundings.





cated a stone's throw away from London is the county of Surrey – the epitome of quintessentially English country life. The villages and towns there have kept their charm. The outstanding beauty of the undulating, wooded Surrey Hills can't help but entice you into the great outdoors. Walking, hiking, biking and horse riding – sporting enthusiasts can practise their hobbies on around 1200 routes through the magnificent natural surroundings. With view after spectacular view, you're spoilt for choice.

Nestled within the Surrey Hills is a home that is built around these splendid views. Instead of following the local construction style, the clients opted for a more open

architecture. Large sliding doors ensure that every room has an uninterrupted view to the outside. There are even interesting lines of sight within the living spaces. The panoramic vista can be enjoyed from both the open plan kitchen and dining area and the rooms on the other side of the building. On the top floor, the bedrooms are connected to one another via an open gallery and roof terrace.

Ingenious planning was required in order to fulfil the desire to make the most of the countryside views. The exposed location of the house on the hillside meant that the windows and sliding doors needed to be able to withstand extremely strong winds and heavy rain. Ultimately, the clients \longrightarrow

opted for large lift-and-slide doors, as they are also very easy to use. The glass areas reflect the sky and the surrounding greenery and, depending on the lighting conditions, make the building seem almost invisible from a distance. The traditional materials used, like natural stone and cedarwood, further enhance this effect. The house therefore blends in seamlessly with the Surrey Hills despite having a construction that is atypical for the region.

Small scale living

TINY HOUSES



Living a simple life that is limited to the essentials:

For a number of years, the Tiny Houses movement, which originated in America in the 1990s, has become a growing trend in Europe too. There's no question that reducing your house to a few square metres is a charming alternative to traditional visions of how one should live. This way of living offers maximum comfort and a great deal of room for improvisation within a tiny amount of space.

Trying something new, conserving resources, protecting the environment and having the reedom to move on at any time – there are many reasons why people live in Tiny Houses. For Janka Riedel, it is the desire for freedom.







An interview with the architect and client, Janka Riedel, about luxury and living in a Tiny House.

panorama: What fascinates you about the idea of a Tiny House?

Janka Riedel: For a very long time, my work has been heavily project-based and very location-oriented, which made the idea of a mobile house simply the response to the question of what I really need to live and work. My degree in spatial strategies at the Muthesius University of Fine Arts and Design in Kiel, where the teaching combines architecture and cultural anthropology, was an excellent foundation for taking a new approach to the "why" and "how" questions.

What does that mean exactly?

Janka Riedel: There is the actual space with its four walls, and then there is also the "perceived" space.

That is where the concept comes in. Despite the spatial overlap, the sleeping, living, relaxing, working, cooking and bathing areas must each function in their own right. In the Tiny House, all of these functions have a place within the 14.3 square metres.

What had to be taken into account during planning?

Janka Riedel: The basic idea was to create a transportable home. To achieve this, the Tiny House could be no larger than 2.40 metres wide and weigh no more than 3.5 tonnes. As inspiration, I looked at a range of prototypes with regard to resource consumption and sustainability, as the house would need to be adapted to the local climatic conditions.

How was your Tiny House built?

Janka Riedel: For the construction, I chose a system made from timber sandwich panels, with the openings for the door and windows already machined out in the factory. The solid construction responds to the climate, providing protection from heat in summer and cold in winter. The interior design, such as the sleeping level, the multifunctional furniture and storage units, and the kitchen, were designed specifically for the house. My goal was to build the Tiny House myself - and I was able to do it with some help from colleagues and their workshops. All of the components were pre-installed in Germany and then assembled on site in Portugal. A facade made from horizontal larch wood panels

surrounds the house and gives it a simple cubic look. As part of the ageing process, the larch wood will turn a shimmering silver colour.

Where is your favourite place in the house?

Janka Riedel: In this very small area, many different spatial scenarios are possible, which each create a wonderful atmosphere depending on the time of day or night. At night, my favourite place has to be the sleeping level, where you can look out through the roof window at the stars. But during the day, this space functions as a working and living area too. A tabletop is integrated into the kitchen cabinets, and also functions as a work area. This is where the ideas for

new projects are created. The view is just beautiful. The large sliding door connects the inside with nature, allowing you to gaze far off into the distance. This spatial extension is essential for the concept, conveying a feeling of endless freedom despite the compact floor plan.

Do you ever think about living in a larger space again?

Janka Riedel: No, even four years on, I still feel at home in my Tiny House. I have so many ideas about how a new house could be further developed in terms of weight and design, to make it even more mobile (editor's note: the house is currently fixed to the floor, which is due to various local regulations), but also in terms of the ecological concept, such as

the generation of energy and treatment of water, in order to become completely self-sufficient.

What advice would you give to anyone interested in a Tiny House?

Janka Riedel: Living in a very small space does not mean having to forsake comfort — but you must remember that there are no other private spaces like there are in a bigger home. My tip would be to try it out! That's the only way to get a feel for whether this type of lifestyle would actually suit you. And one last piece of advice — make sure you get involved with your own design ideas!

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
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
